Hello Memphis HOG!!

Merry Christmas/happy holidays and Happy New Year!!

It's hard to believe we're at the end of the year!

Despite getting off to a slow start, I think we had a great year!! We had some great trips, (I loved the Dragon Tail, Ozarks and Patti's Settlement rides,) and some well-

attended chapter meetings and outings. Thanks to Roelant and Amy!!

Even with a late start, our membership grew. At the time of this writing, we have 159 members. We started 2020 with somewhere in the neighborhood of 92. So, we added quite a few new faces this year through new bike purchases, paid memberships, and a handful of new members that came over from Ghost River. And remember, we were very limited with what we could do as far as events or activities where we could get out and volunteer or set up a membership table. So, given the circumstances, I'd like to think we had a pretty good year!!

As we head into the new year, and as I mentioned at the Thanksgiving dinner, it's time to renew. This is that annual ritual we must go through with completing a new form and paying our dues. As a reminder, **the annual dues are now \$25.00 starting in 2021.** This is the first increase since our chapter's inception in 1986, and even with the increase, I think we all get more than our money's worth!

As we prepare for renewal season, I wanted to mention a few things.

Completing a new form each year is a national HOG requirement. The membership form is a legal document, and "is the number one document you have to protect the chapter in the case of an accident during a chapter event." For that matter, the membership form, the event release forms for both adults and minors, and the minor's assumption of risk acknowledgement, are legal documents, and critically important. This probably came to light from the Past Director's ride. Fortunately, we had all the required documents on that day. In light of the accident, we need to be especially vigilant in ensuring we have a signed form for each of us. If you bring a non-member or a minor to a ride, please let us know, the road captain(s,) etc., so we can make sure all the necessary forms are signed before the group heads out on the road.

With that said, here a few reminders for the renewal process.

- 1. EVERYONE is required to complete a new membership form. If you are a current member that is renewing, we need a new membership form. If you are taking advantage of the free membership from the purchase of a new or used bike, we need a new membership form.
- 2. ALL membership forms MUST be dated January 1, 2021 or later. This is very important! This is a National HOG requirement, as renewals are done on an annual basis. If you already submitted your renewal and it's dated prior to 1/1/21, you will be required to complete a new one. PLEASE do not make any changes to the membership form as National HOG considers it a contract.
- 3. If you are renewing your current membership, the dues are \$25.00 per member. We accept cash, or check made out to Memphis HOG Chapter #4928.

- 4. Please return the forms and dues as soon as possible. Your choices are:
 - a. Take your membership form and payment to the parts counter at Bumpus H-D on Whitten Rd.
 - b. Mail your membership form and dues to:

- c. Pay via PayPal at <u>memhog4928@gmail.com</u>. When paying with PayPal, we ask that you please use the "friends & family" option AND please write "membership" in the comment section so we know what it is for.
- d. Turn in the completed membership form and dues at the Christmas party on Saturday, 1/19/2020.

DEADLINE TO TURN IN YOUR MEMBERSHIP FORMS IS FEBRUARY 28^{TH,} 2021.

Effective March 1, 2021, if we have not received your membership form or dues by this date, you will be removed from our roster, as well as the members only Facebook page...so please be sure to get everything turned in on a timely basis. We will also update the national HOG roster as well. This does not mean that you cannot still join, but it is a lot less work to keep you on all the rosters rather than removing you and then having to go back and re-add all your information.

"Every Ride A Memory" Jim and Carol Tactac Membership Officers



I was really proud of the way everyone handled himself or herself on the fall outing trip to Patty's Settlement. The group road in a tight staggered formation group most of the time. This allowed the group to move through traffic without getting cut off by other trucks and cars. A reminder-If you don't feel comfortable riding in a

tight formation consider moving to the back of the line where you can ride at your own pace and not affect the rest of the group. I will be holding a group-riding course in January while the weather is cold. I will set a date for this class by the next HOG meeting. Attached is my article of the month. Keep the shiny side up and ride safe.

Cover the Controls - A function of speed, not style By James R. Davis

If you have read some of my other articles you know that I am a strong advocate of covering the front brake lever while I've been essentially quiet about whether or not you should cover your clutch lever while riding.

Further, you probably know that I prefer to use two fingers to cover my brake and, when I do cover my clutch, I prefer to cover it using all four fingers. So, what's the deal? What's the logic that explains these differences?

First, let's look at <u>why</u> we cover a lever. Whether it's the brake or the clutch, the ONLY reason we cover these controls is to reduce reaction time when we need to operate them. In exchange for reduced reaction time we pay a price - we have less control of the corresponding grip when some of our fingers are covering a lever instead of being in contact with that grip.

The next question is not as obviously answered as the first one: <u>When</u> should you cover those controls? The answer is that we cover them whenever we might have a need to quickly use them, but NOT when quick usage of the control (or simply covering it) can be dangerous.

The brake lever is the one that most of us cover virtually all the time. Is there a time when it should NOT be covered? You bet. At slow speeds, particularly when making turns. In these cases, the use of your front brake is often so counter-productive or dangerous that you are far better off having the fingers of your right hand wrapped around the throttle.

Another time you want to keep your fingers off the brake lever is when you are about to surmount an obstacle in the road. If you take a firm jolt to the front or back wheel you must not lose your hold on the grip and having all of your fingers wrapped around it is your best insurance against that happening.

So, it follows that in general you want to cover your front brake lever anytime you might have to stop quickly. In other words, almost always if your motorcycle is moving faster than you can run.

But should you cover it with two fingers? Three? Four?

The answer to that question raises no end of controversy amongst seasoned riders. I suggest that you use as many fingers as you are comfortable using over an extended period of time. In my case, I use two fingers. If I try to use three, my hand gets cramped as I try to maintain the other one in contact with the grip. If I use four fingers, then without a wrist rest to give me positive control of my throttle I find myself unable to smoothly control speed and my thumb will cramp over time. Since the right grip is itself a control (throttle), it is my preference to use two fingers to cover the brake lever and two to maintain contact with the throttle. Further, using two fingers GREATLY reduces the odds that in a panic I might try the <u>dangerous</u> practice of 'grabbing a handful' of brake.

When to cover your clutch, lever is a little subtler than when to cover your front brake lever. However, since the left grip is not itself another control, when you do cover the clutch you should use all four fingers. And, of course, the clutch lever can be squeezed until it contacts the grip. That means that if you use less than four fingers to cover the lever you can trap the other fingers between the lever and the grip.

The clutch is not used simply to disengage power from the rear wheel. Its friction zone is used to act like a Vernier control of speed, and it is far more subtle in doing that job than the throttle is, particularly at slow speeds. Thus, covering the clutch makes sense at slow speeds.

At higher speeds, however, covering the clutch is essentially useless. The price you pay to cover the clutch at higher speeds is a diminished control of the left grip. Since the brake lever should be covered when traveling at any reasonable speed, it makes sense to me that the clutch should not.

And, like the brake lever, the clutch should NOT be covered if you are about to surmount an obstacle in the road. This is to minimize the chance of losing control of the grip altogether.

- COVER THE CLUTCH AT SLOW SPEEDS
- COVER THE BRAKE AT HIGHER SPEEDS

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It's the end of the year and as things hopefully start to slow dow, it's a great time to do a little digital house cleaning. If you haven't already heard there has been a massive data breach in the US again, with both businesses, civilian and government agencies involved. It's a good time to update those passwords and that account info.

Many of you may receive a gift where you have to register the product online or create a login account to use the product. Now is as good time as any to start with some additional online security!

This time of year I start going through my accounts and changing the passwords and checking security policies that may have changed on the website. It's a good time to check for changes to security policies on social media accounts as well. If you can you should document your accounts and passwords and store it somewhere safe with other important documents. When I setup a new or update an account, I have a few techniques that I use to try and secure my accounts and to make it harder for bad-actors to steel my account info.

1. Don't use your name for accounts that you use to create or register with online with. Create a "dummy" account that doesn't contain your name or identifying information like your birthday. For example, create a dummy email account like harley16@gmail.com for registering with online sites. You can then add this account to your real email account so you can check your email with a desktop or mobile device. Keep up with the email addresses that you create and check them frequently to see if they may have been taken over.

2. Change your passwords as often as possible, at least once a month. Especially, for financial sites like banks, investment accounts, or credit cards.

3. Understand what password formats are allowed on the site. Most sites require at least 8 characters. Use special characters where you can like \$_%1 along with other alpha numeric characters. Use lower case letters to replace zero as in 2o2o so you know that is a small o instead of a Capital O that may resemble a zero 0 in some fonts.

4. Turn on two-factor authentication so the website will text your mobile device a code to enter to authenticate you, besides just using your password.

5. Don't ever click on links embedded in emails or text messages from people that you don't know, or would not expect to get some vague message from. The message may appear to be from a friend who's account may have been hacked! Notify, the person if you know them their account may have been hacked!

There are plenty of other things to do to secure your online reputation, and finances! Don't make it any easier for bad-actors to steal your info than you have to. It's bad enough they can possibly steal it from the site itself!

I thought this article below was pretty good about social media, specifically Facebook. It's a great way to see if someone might be using, or attempting your use your Facebook account.
